CHAPTER ONE

1.0 Introduction

Tanzania covers 945,234 sq. km with 942,832 sq. km for Tanzania mainland and 2,400 sq.km for Zanzibar. About 32.5 percent of the country's land area (307,800 Km²) is protected areas which are under the management of the Ministry of Natural Resources and Tourism. These include, 21 National Parks, 29 Game Reserves, 25 Game Controlled Areas, Ngorongoro Conservation Area, 419 Natural Forest Reserves, 23 Nature Reserves, 9 Coastal Forests, 24 Government Forest plantations, 12 Bee Reserves, 133 Cultural Heritage Sites, 7 Museums and 3 Ramsar Sites. Currently, there are 38 Wildlife Management Areas (WMAs) which are in various stages of establishment, of which 22 WMAs have been registered and gazette as Authorized Association (AA) and 16 WMAs are in the different stages of authorization. These areas are distributed in various ecological systems and differ in conservation status depending on the type of use.

Tanzania's natural and cultural resources are considered among the finest tourism attractions in the world. They include the Serengeti plains, the spectacular Ngorongoro Crater, and Africa's highest Mountain Kilimanjaro – in the North. Mikumi, Ruaha National Parks and the Selous Game Reserve in the South. Amani, Magamba, Chome and Kalambo river nature reserves. In addition, other attractions include the sandy beaches north and south of Dar es Salaam, the Spice Islands of Zanzibar and excellent deep-sea fishing at Mafia and Pemba Islands. Generally, in the stated Indian Ocean islands are remains of ancient settlements. The Olduvai Gorge in the interior Rift Valley is the site of discoveries of the trace of earliest man. Tanzania also offers interesting culture and arts to tourists, notably the Maasai culture, arts and traditional handcrafts. Tanzanians are friendly people with a long tradition of generosity, hospitality and intangible cultural heritage.

The annual statistical bulletin contains information on tourism, wildlife, antiquities, forestry and beekeeping as well as related investment opportunities within protected areas. The main objective of this bulletin is to provide current statistics to stakeholders. These statistics are relevant for planning, promotion, budgeting and evaluation of sector performance.

1.1 Glossary

S/N	TERMS	Explanations
1.	Arrivals	This term refers to the number of visitor's arrivals, not the number of persons. The same person who makes several trips to a given country during a given period will be counted each time as a new arrival.
2.	International Visitor	The term "International Visitor" describes any person who travels to a country other than that in which has his/her usual residence but outside his/her usual environment for a period not exceeding twelve months and whose main purpose of visit is other than the exercise of any activity remunerated from within the country visited. This definition covers two classes of visitors: international tourists and international same day visitor.
3.	International Tourist	For Statistical purpose, the term international tourist describes an international visitor who travels to a country for at least one night and whose main purpose of visit include one of the following: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> i. Leisure and holidays (HV): recreation, cultural events, health, active sports (non- professional), other leisure and holiday purposes; ii. Visiting friends and relatives (VFR); iii. Business and professional (BV): meeting, mission, Incentive travel, other business; or iv. Other tourism purposes (OTH): studies, health treatment, transit etc.



S/N	TERMS	Explanations
4	International Same-Day Visitor (Excursionist)	<p>The term “international same-day visitor” describes international visitors who visit another country for less than 24 hours and does not stay overnight. They include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">i. Cruise Passengers: Who arrive in a country on a cruise ship and return to the ship each night to sleep on board even though the ship remains in port for several days. Also visitors included in this group are by extension, passengers on a group tour accommodated in a train.ii. Crew members: who do not spend the night in the country of destinations; this group also includes crews of warships on a courtesy visit to a port in the country of destination; and who spend the night on board ship and not at the destination.
5	Domestic Visitor	<p>The term “domestic visitor” describes any person residing in a country, who travel to a place within the country, outside his/her usual environment for a period not exceeding twelve months and whose main purpose of visit is other than the exercise of an activity remunerated from within the place visited. This definition covers two classes of visitors’ namely domestic tourist and domestic same – day visitor.</p>

S/N	TERMS	Explanations
6	Domestic Tourist	<p>The term “domestic tourist” describes a domestic visitor whose visit is for at least one night and whose main purpose of visit may be classified under one of the following three groups:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> i. Leisure and holidays: recreation, cultural events, health, active sports, (non-professional) and other leisure and holiday purpose; ii. visiting friends and relatives; iii. Business and professional: meeting, mission, incentive travel, other business; and iv. Other tourism purposes: Studies, health treatment, transit etc.
7	Domestic Same-Day Visitor	<p>The term “domestic same-day visitor” describes a domestic visitor whose visit lasts less than 24 hours and does not involve an overnight stay.</p>
8	Night	<p>These refer to the number of nights spent by person in accommodation establishments. If one person travels to a country and spends five nights, that makes five tourist nights.</p>
9	Accommodation establishment	<p>Refers to all means of accommodation including not only hotels and similar establishments but also supplementary means of accommodation.</p>



S/N	TERMS	Explanations
10	Average Length of Stay	This is the number of days from arrival to departure dates or intended length of stay of a visitor. The number is generally obtained from sample surveys covering the exact length of stay by checking arrival and departure dates or by referring to the declared intended length of stay. The number of nights in most instance, covers the length of stay at accommodation establishments and thus does not necessarily show the total length of stay in the country.
11	Transport	This refers to the mode of transport used by visitors or tourists in arriving at a destination or a place visited.
12	Accommodation	Accommodation can be described by number of rooms and/number of bed-places. Number of rooms This refers to the total capacity in rooms of establishments offering accommodation available during the peak period of the tourist season. Data refer in general to the entire country, although in certain cases it is limited to particular zones. Number of beds available This refers to the total capacity in bed-places of establishments offering accommodation available during the peak period of the tourist season. Data refer in general to the entire country, but in some cases, this is limited to particular zones.

S/N	TERMS	Explanations
13	Occupancy Rates	The occupancy rate corresponds to the relationship between available capacity and the extent to which it is used. This rate may refer either to use of rooms or beds. Occupancy rates are based on the number of nights spent.
14	Tourism and Economy	<p>International tourism receipts and expenditures</p> <p>These are defined as the receipts of a country resulting from tourist expenditure, i.e. payments for goods and services made by international visitors for their own use or goods and services which they decide to donate.</p>
15	Purpose of Visit	The main purpose of tourism trip to a destination (or place visited) is determined by the main activities in which the visitors have been or will be involved during the trip at destination. The main purpose of visit for tourists is classified into four categories which are: Visiting Friends/Relatives; Leisure and Holiday; Business and Professionals; and Other (any reason other than those under the three categories).

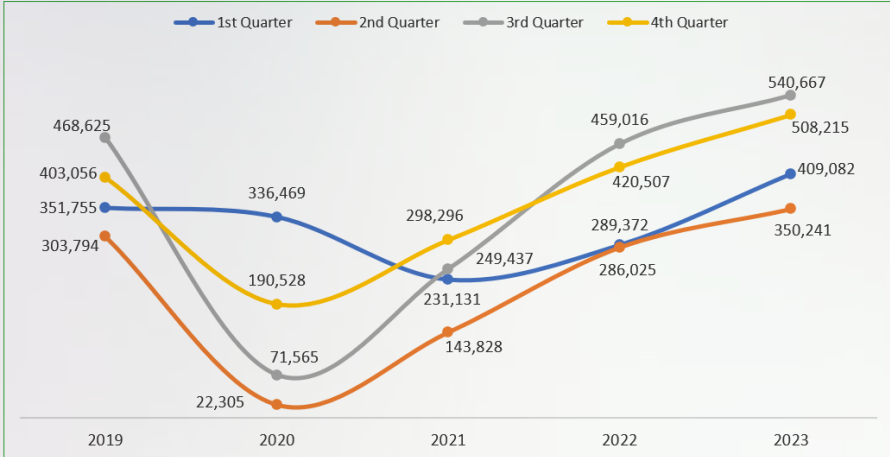
Chart 2: Monthly Trend of International Visitor Arrivals; 2022- 2023

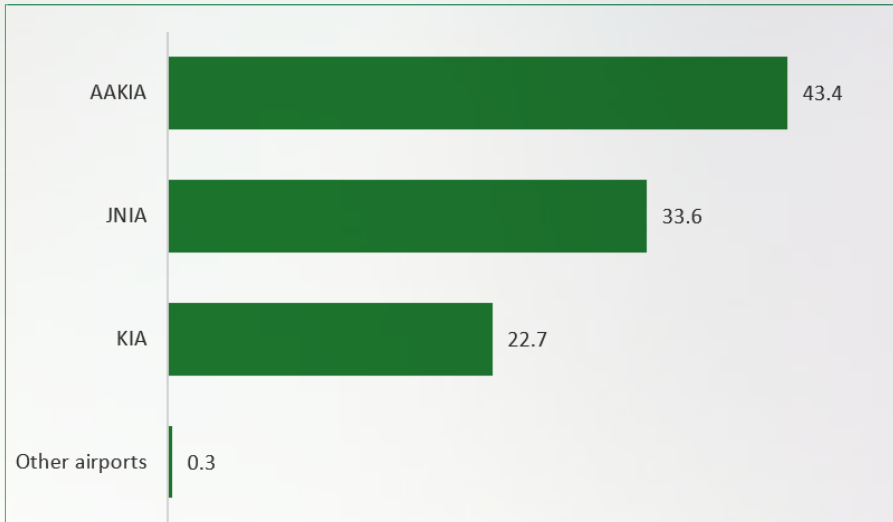
Chart 4: Share of International Visitor Arrivals by Modes of Transportation; 2020-2023

Chart 5: Share of International Visitor Arrivals at Airports; 2023

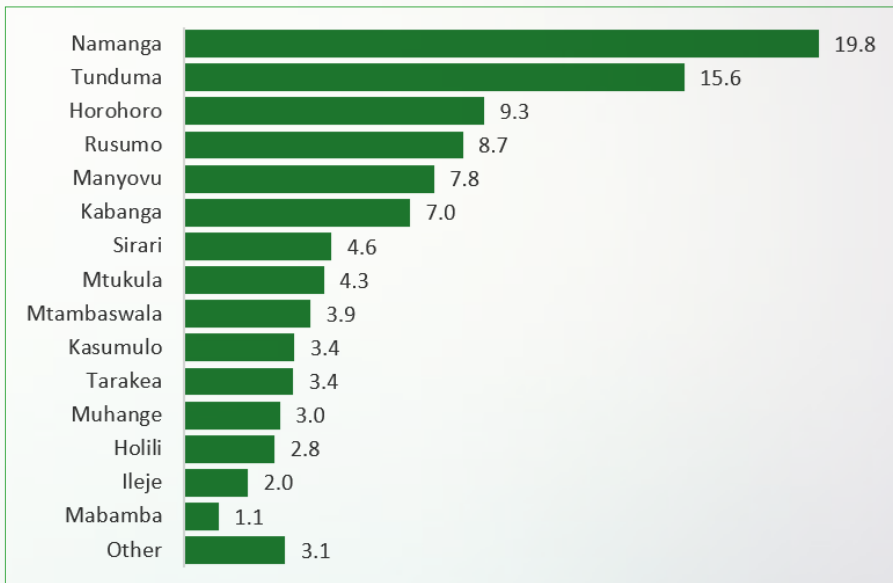

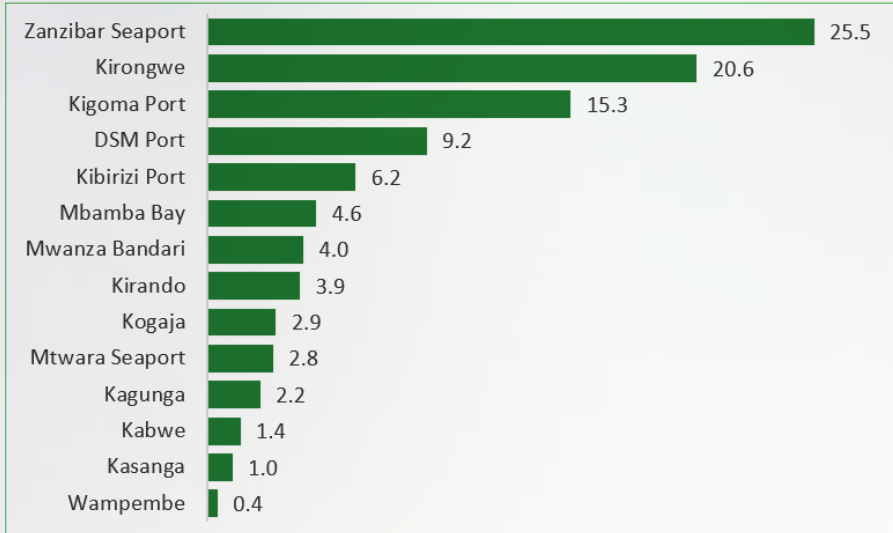

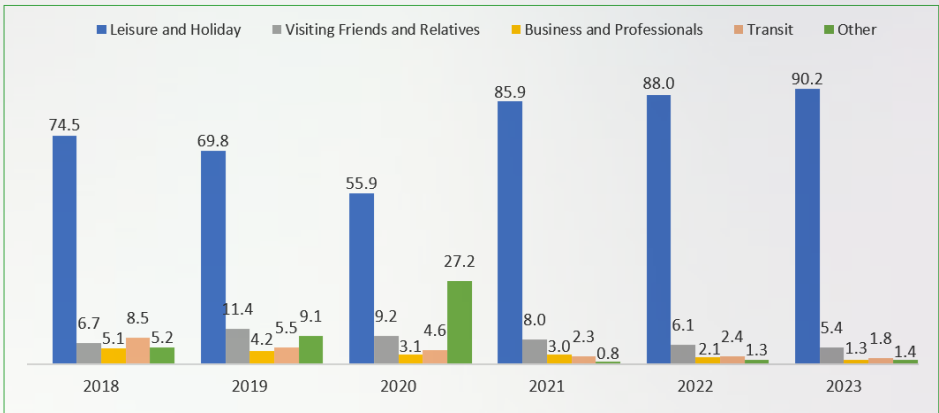

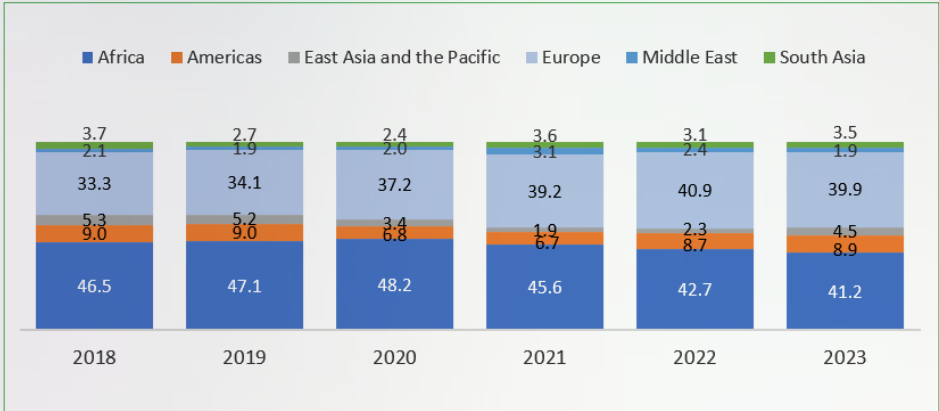

Chart 9: Share of International Visitor Arrivals by Regions; 2018-2023

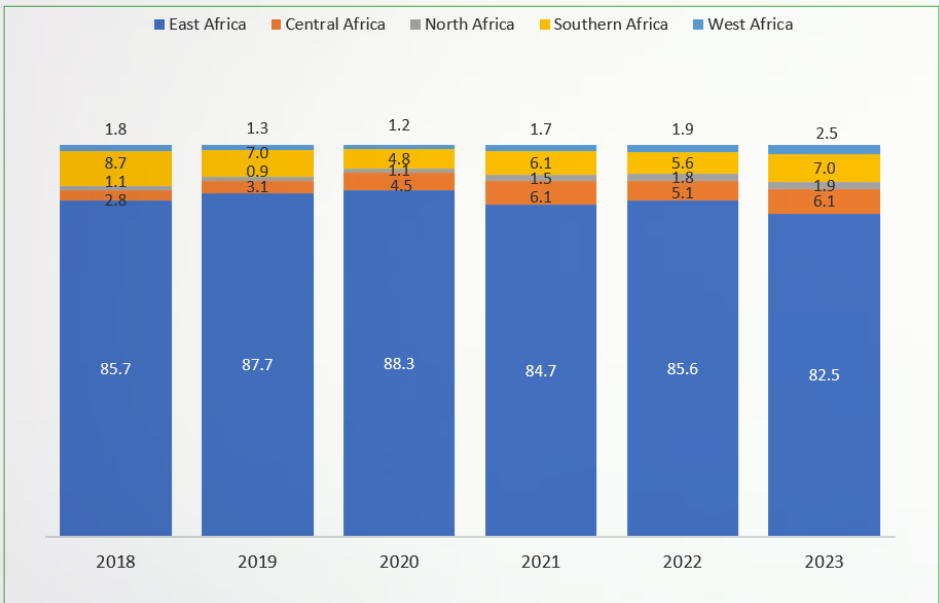

Chart 10: Share of Visitor Arrivals from Africa by Sub -regions; 2018-2023

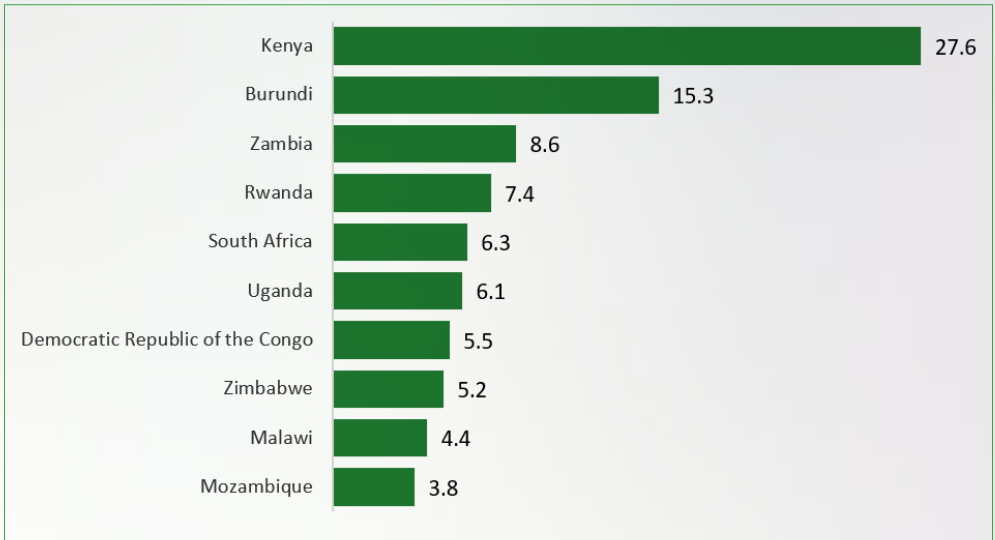

Chart 11: Share of Top 10 Source Markets of Visitor Arrivals from Africa; 2023

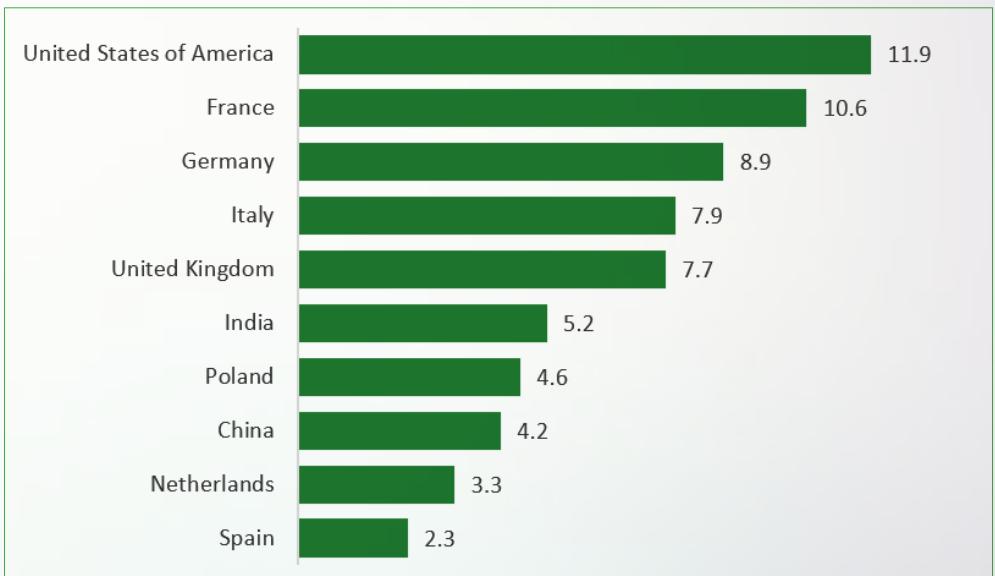

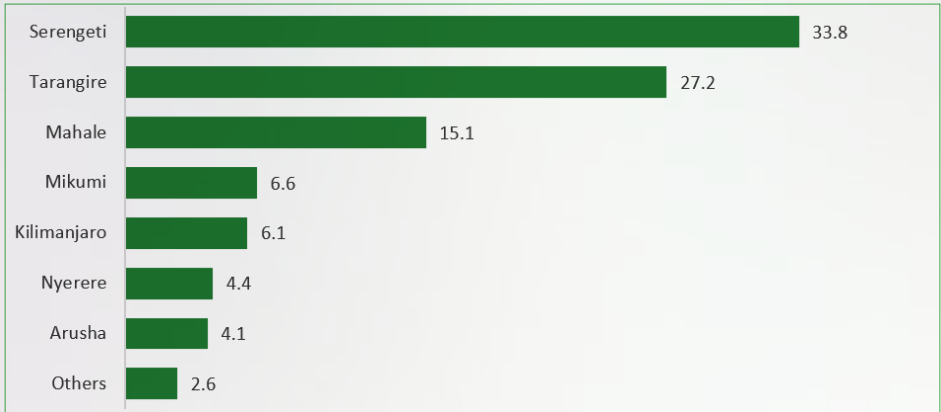

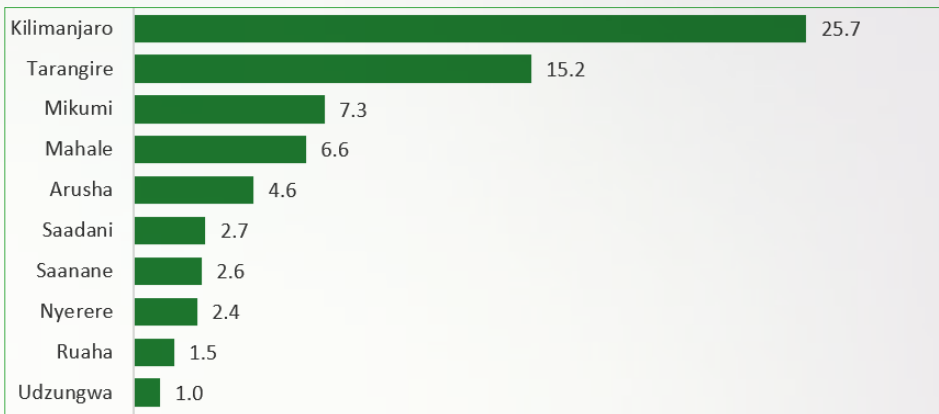

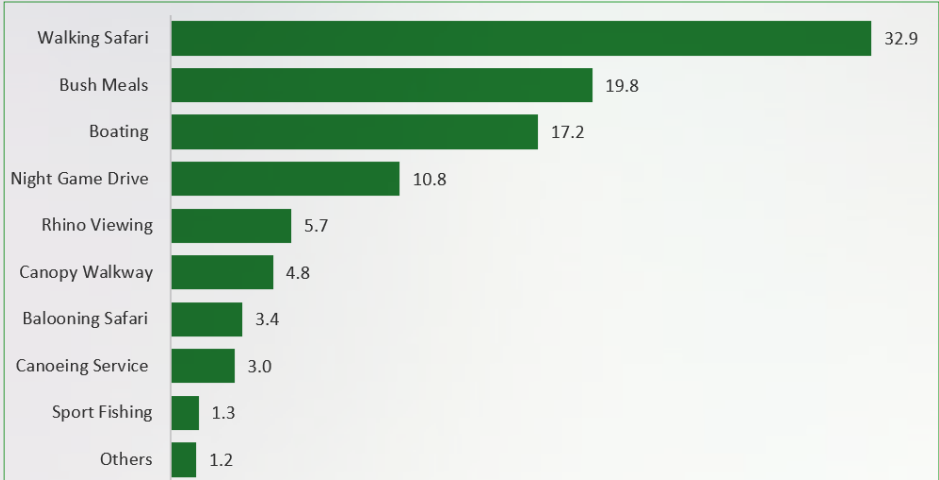

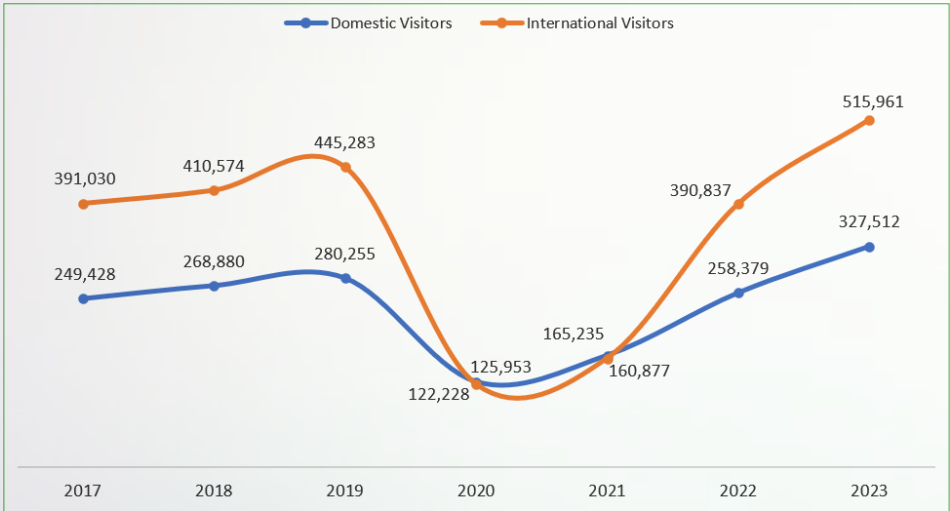


Chart 18: Monthly Trend of Domestic Visitor Arrivals at Ngorongoro Conservation Area; 2022-2023

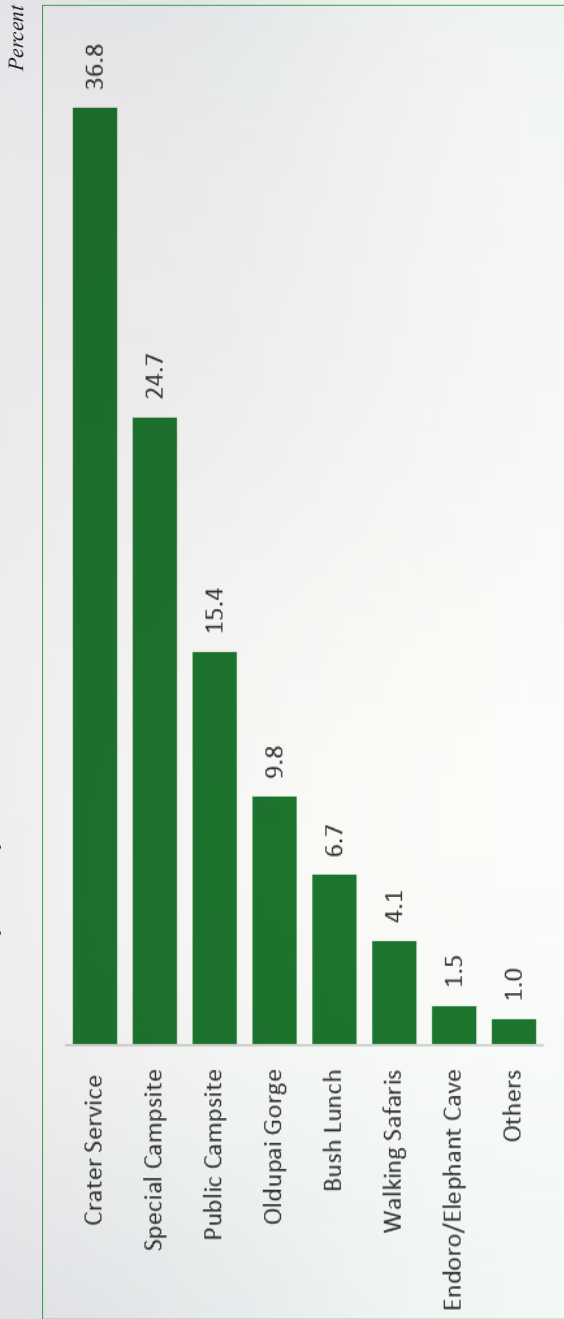

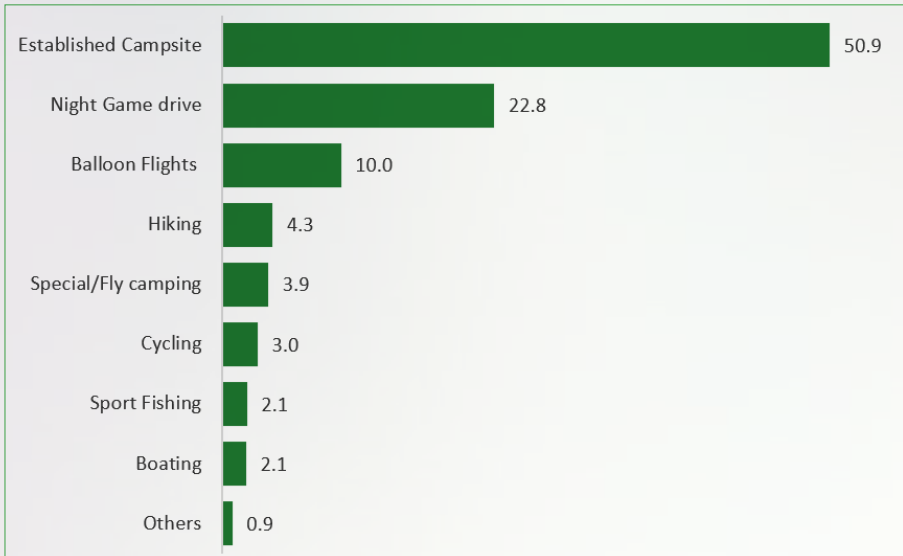

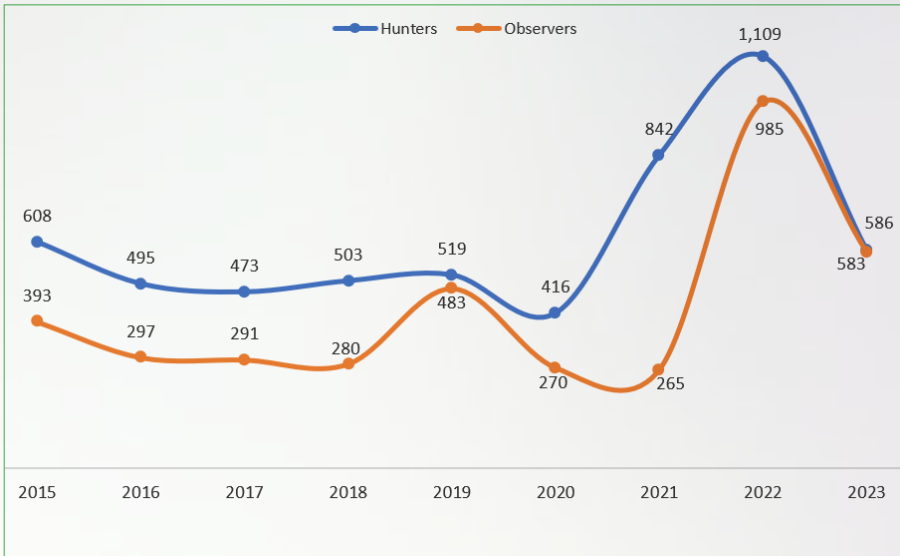

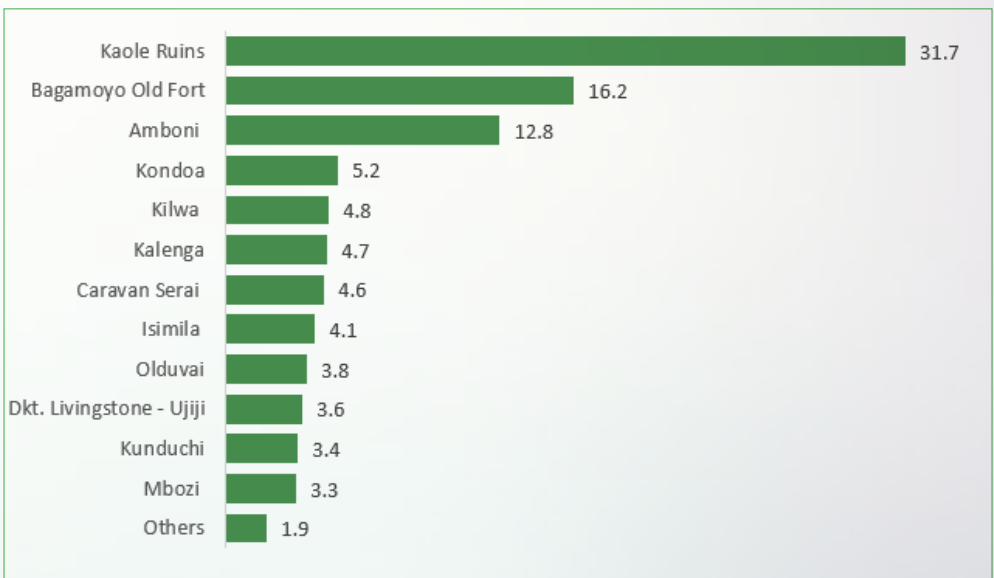
Chart 25: Monthly Trend of Domestic Visitor Arrivals at Antiquities Sites; 2023

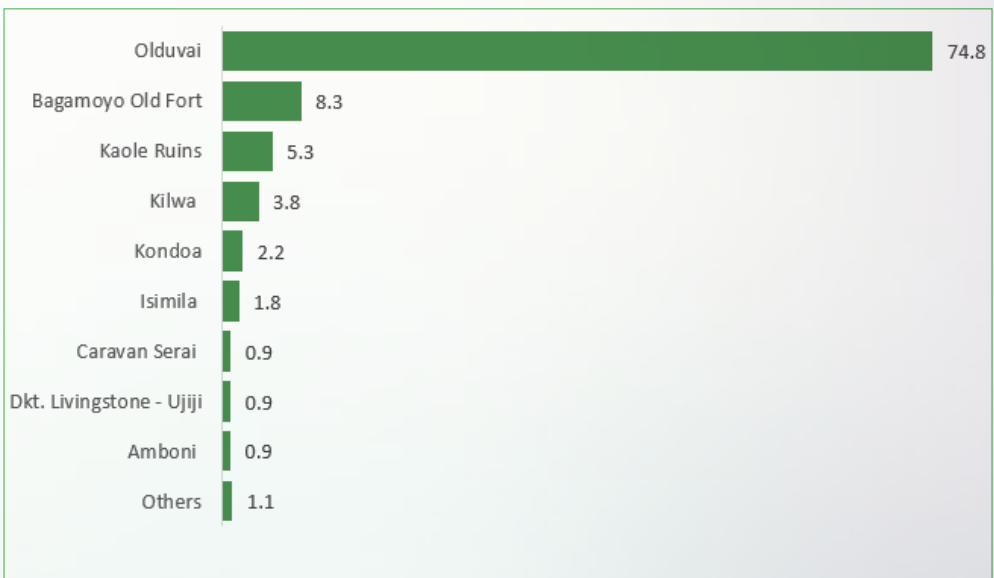
Chart 27: Monthly Trend of International Visitor Arrivals at Antiquities Sites; 2023

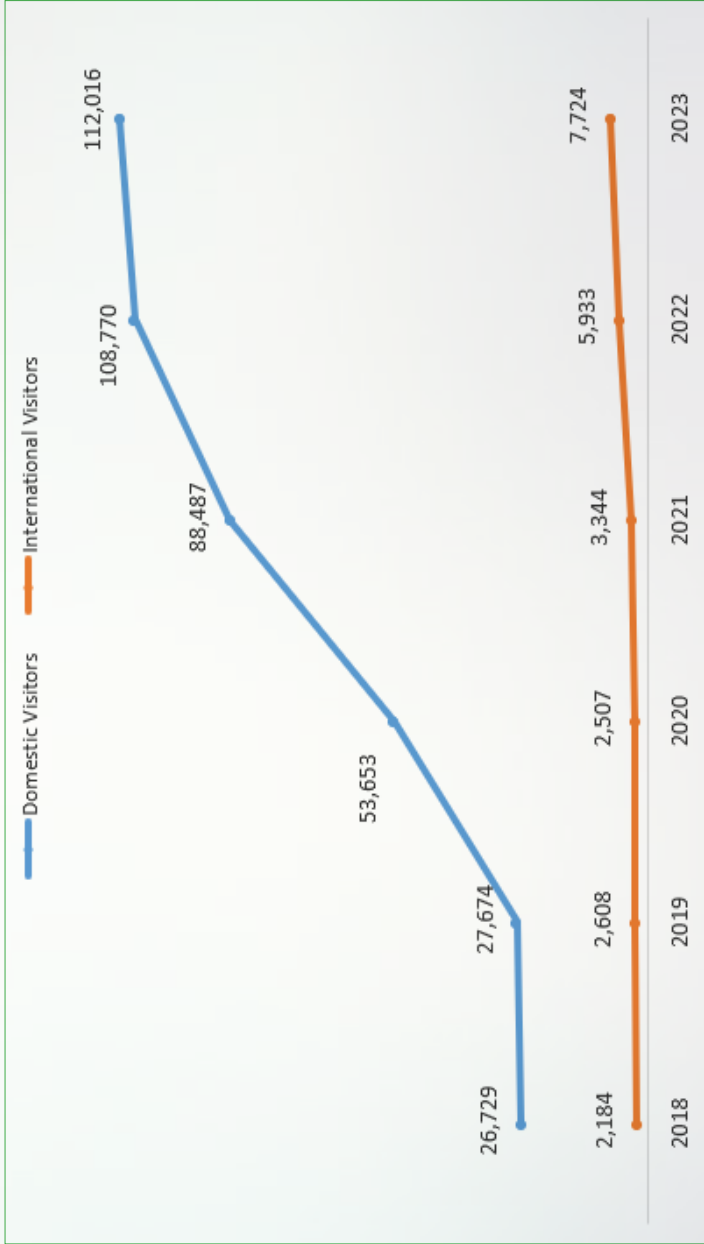

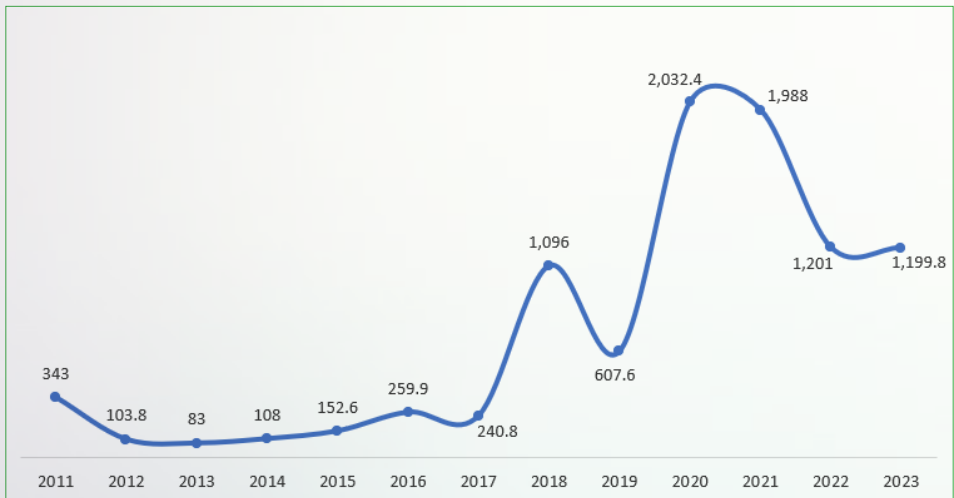

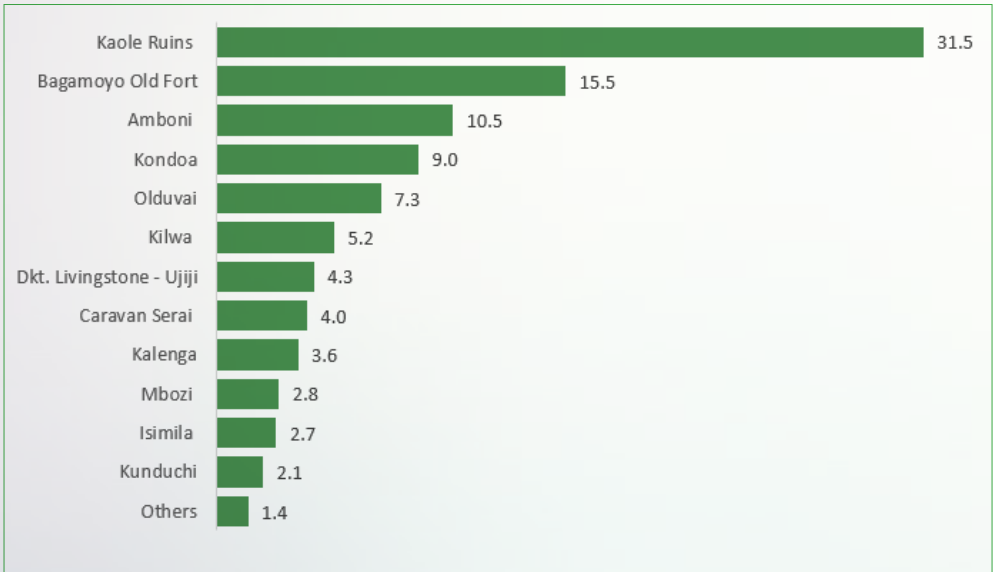
Chart 37: Monthly Revenue from Domestic Visitors at Antiquities Sites; 2023 (TZS '000')

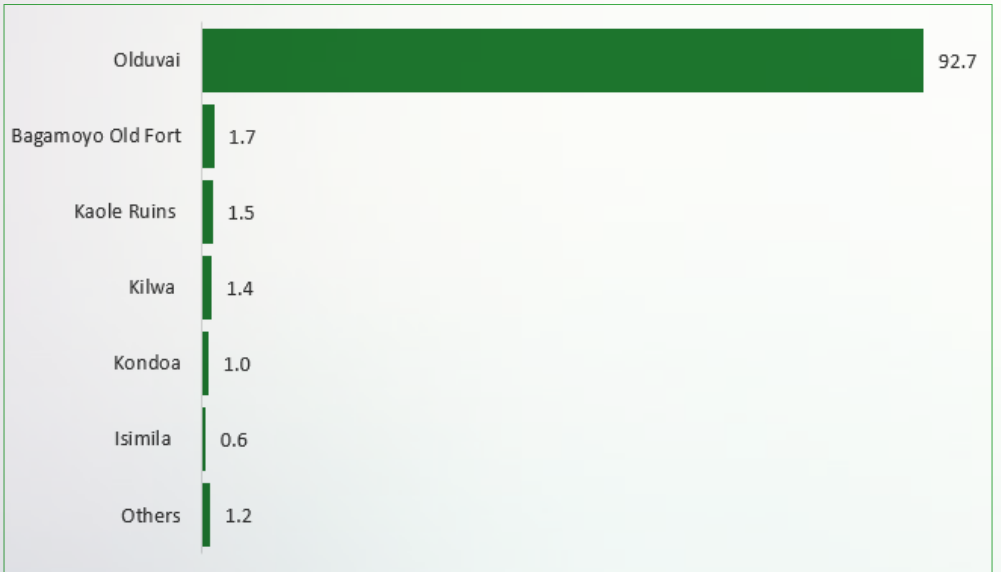
Chart 39: Monthly Trend of Revenue (in USD) from Arrivals of International Visitors at Antiquities Sites; 2023

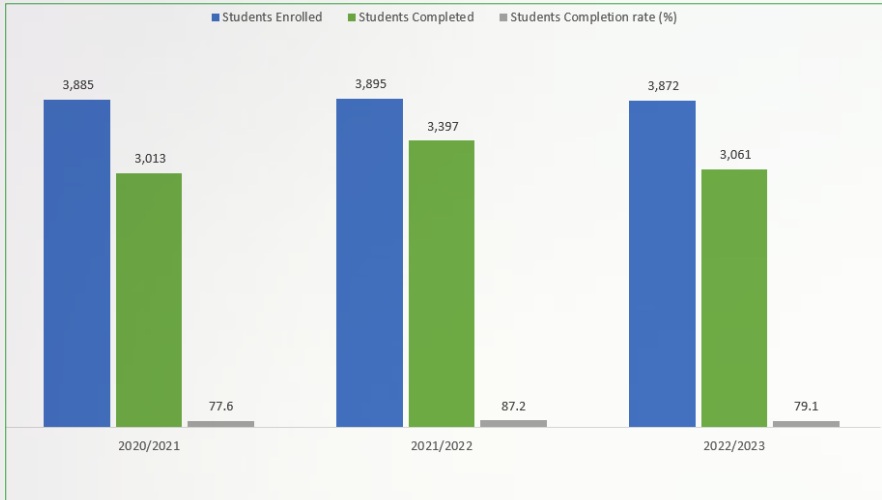
